STRONG SALES MAY TRIGGER FURTHER FOREIGN EXPANSION

All Stores reported a 10.1% increase in sales during the month of May. This growth bolstered year-to-date figures that rose to 6.8%. May's double-digit jump is particularly impressive as it compounds a 9.6% increase at this time last year.

With consumer confidence continuing to grow, the nation's strong economy, booming housing market and robust dollar fuelled increased spending. General Merchandise stores rose 6.5% as Wal-Mart continued to blanket Ontario with its new Supercentres. Despite the looming threat of these sprawling stores, Food and Beverage retailers continued to grow as sales increased 7.6% in May.

Pharmacies and Personal Care Stores enjoyed 10.0% growth as leaders such as Shoppers Drug Mart proved undaunted by Bill 102 and generic drug interchangeability. The chain's continued renovation of existing stores and construction of new format locations has also driven front-shop sales through an aggressively expanded assortment of cosmetics, fragrance, and convenience goods.

Sporting Goods, Hobby, Music and Book Stores rose 9.2% as shoppers prepared themselves for the summer months ahead. Amidst this category's shining results, music stores continue

to suffer from stagnant sales. The impending launch of the Apple iPhone and recent closure of Sam the Record Man's Yonge Street flagship are harbingers of this sector's grim outlook.

Meanwhile, Computer Software, Home Electronics, and Appliance Stores rekindled storekeepers' spirits with figures that climbed 8.0% in May, and helped Furniture, Home Furnishings, and Electronics stores jump 8.8%.

Building and Outdoor Home Supplies Stores also joined the roster of categories enjoying double-digit growth as sales climbed 11.4%. Excitement is building as Lowe's Canadian expansion will seek to tap into this burgeoning market.

May's strong 9.4% growth among Clothing Stores also underpins another American merchant's market entry as Forever 21 opened in Toronto. They

join Abercrombie & Fitch and Mango in the recent onslaught of foreign clothiers setting up shop in Canada.

As May's sales growth outpaced the U.S. by 4.7 percentage points, it is expected that Canada will become an increasingly attractive destination for international retailers seeking expansion opportunities. Limited Brand's acquisition of La Senza is but one example of the continued infiltration of global retailers into the Canadian marketplace. As these merchants introduce innovative best practices and new product assortments into the market, Canadian companies will have to prove increasingly savvy in order to remain competitive.

Please note:

The J.C. Williams Group National Retail Bulletin compares the latest monthly release of "raw" (i.e., unadjusted for seasonality) retail sales figures to those in the *same calendar month of the previous year*. Statistics Canada also reports seasonally adjusted sales that are compared to the *previous month within the current calendar year* to measure change in Gross Domestic Product (GDP). Although other sources use seasonally adjusted figures, J.C. Williams Group believes that using raw figures and making comparisons to the previous year's performance more accurately reflects the seasonality of the retail industry and, therefore, are more useful in analysis.

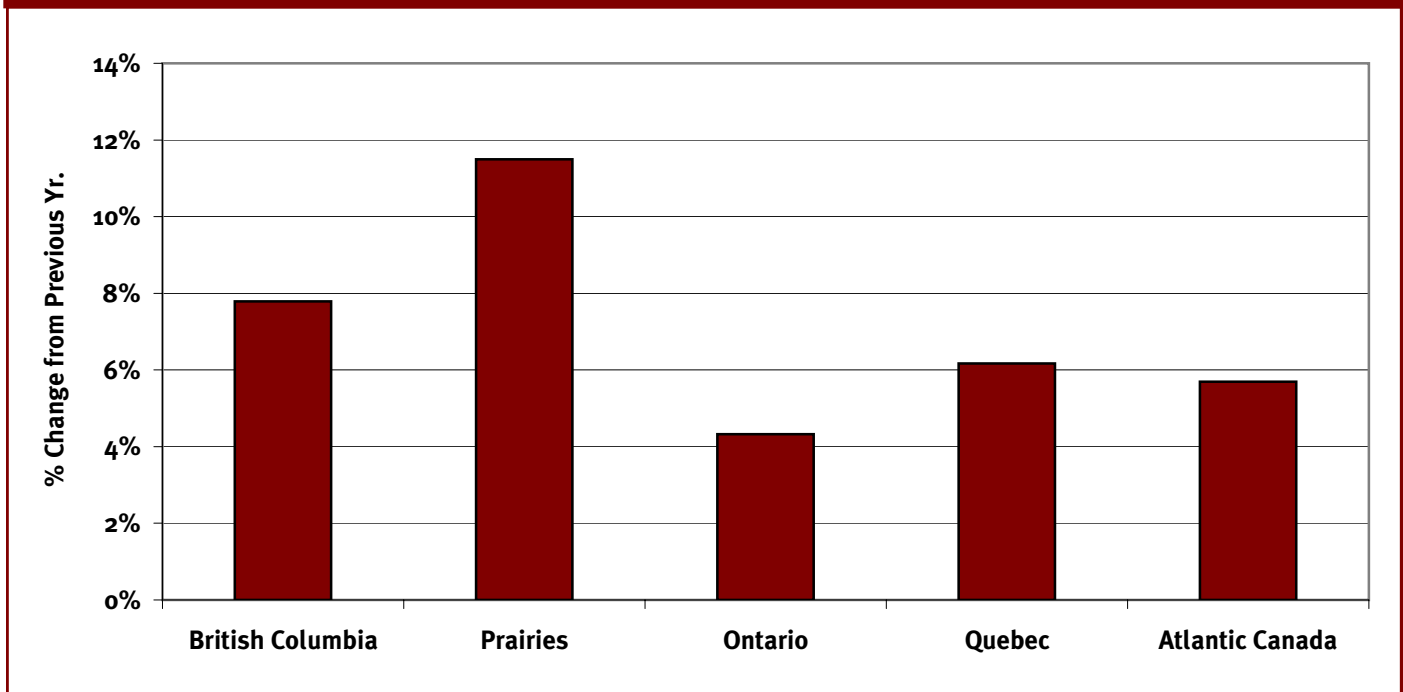

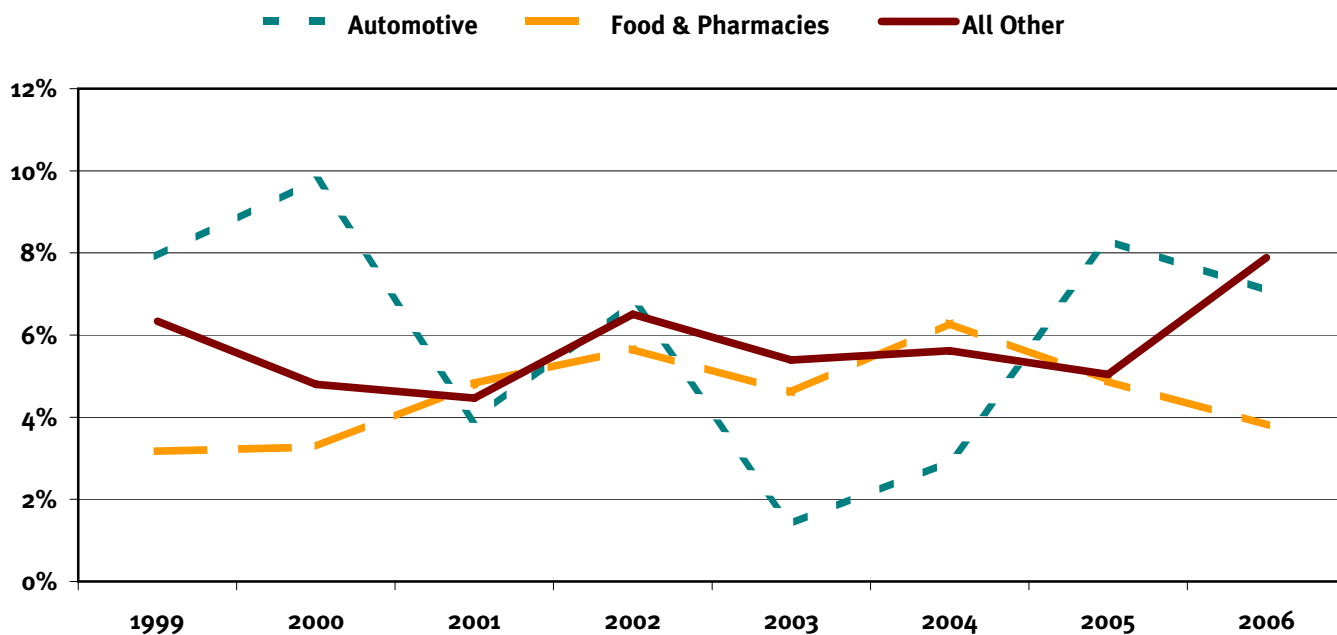

Percentage Change in Retail Trade, All Stores, By Region Year-to-date Compared to Same Period Last Year

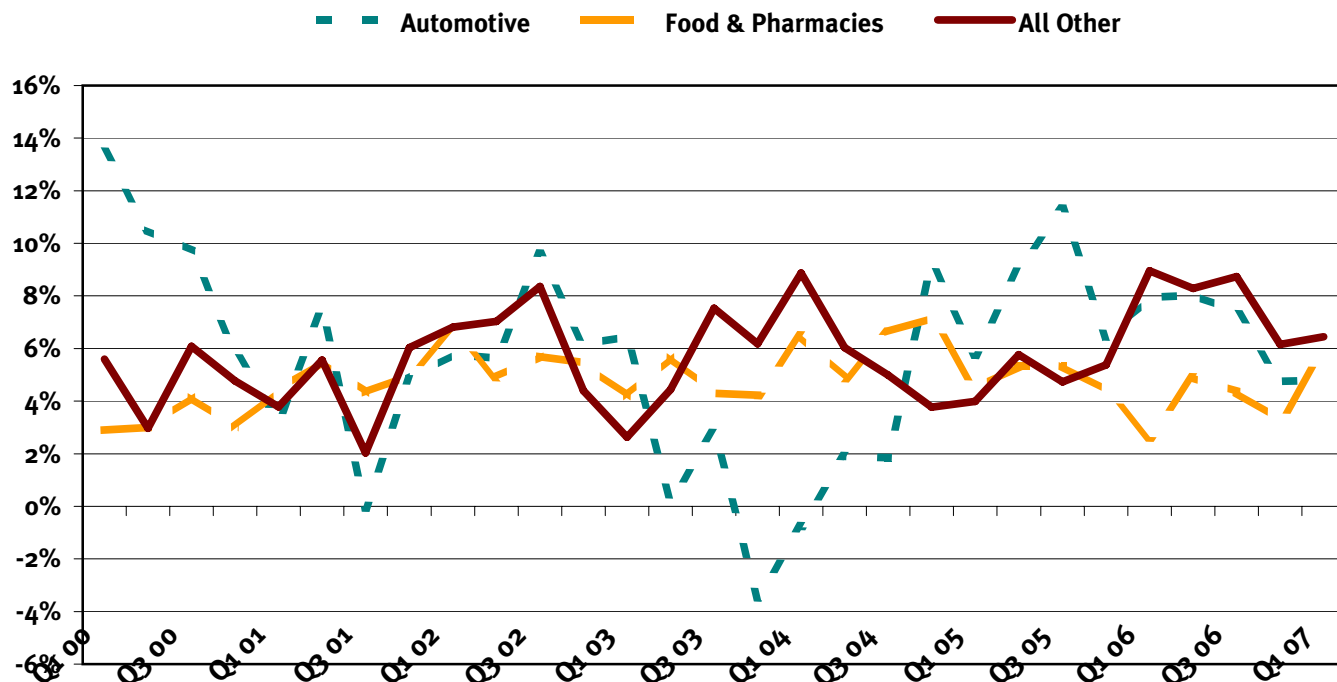

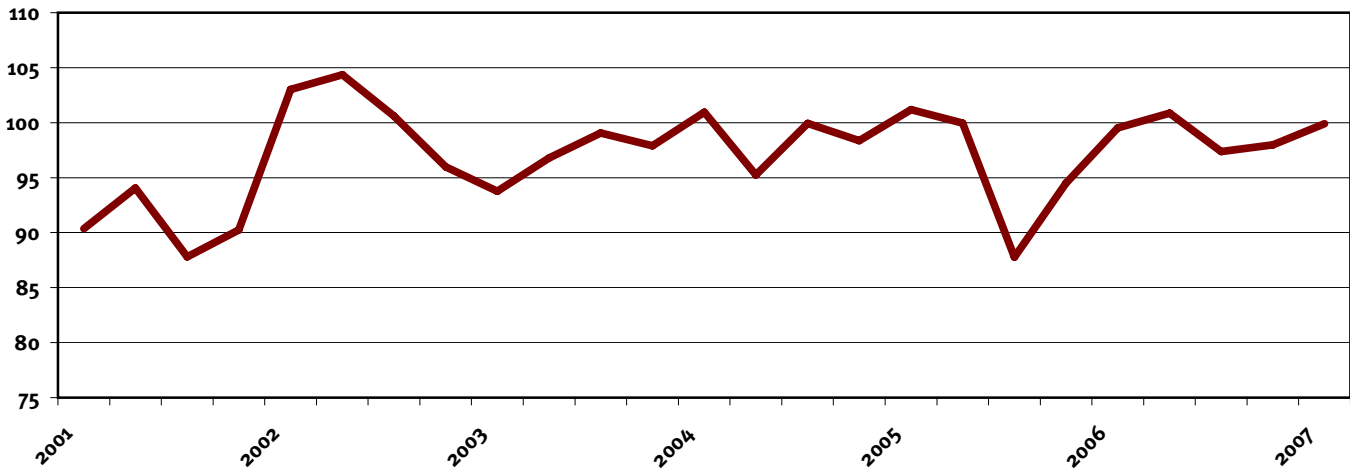
